is now the number one issue for online child sex crime fighters.

So, what is it?





Sextortion, or sexual extortion, is a form of blackmail where an offender threatens to share images or videos in exchange for money or more content.





In Australia, almost 4200 sextortion reports were lodged in 2021-22.

This is a 55% increase on the previous year.





The Australian Federal Police has seen a hundred-fold increase in reports this year.





"It's an epidemic."

In 75% of cases where the abuser is after more sexual content, the victims are girls.

Where an offender is chasing money, boys are overwhelmingly targeted.

This is called financial sextortion.





Demands from offenders when abusing victims can range from \$50 to \$10,000.

The ACCCE is seeing more than 100 reports of this type of financial sextortion each month.
