In 2021, a rapid increase in online Sexual Extortion for financial gain was reported across a number of countries. Within six months, over 1000 Australians were reporting as victims of this crime each month. The ACCCE was uniquely positioned to coordinate a national response to the sextortion of children by utilising capabilities across the Commonwealth, domestic and international Law Enforcement, and the Financial Services industry. Operation Huntsman is an innovative national response to the targeting of Australian children by international organised crime syndicates.
